
March Outing

Anybody thinking about buying a printer? I know I have been toying with the idea for some time, the convenience of printing your own images whenever you want, the supposed better results from being able to maintain some quality control over the product, and the satisfaction of producing another of your own works of art.

Weigh this against the cost of the printer, paper and ink, and the thought of learning yet another piece of software to produce the perfect image, the waste of ink and paper, and it is no wonder many of us are relying on places like Wal-Mart and Costco to print our images for us. Speaking of ink currently it is cheaper for me to buy another cheap printer then it is to replace my ink cartages.

I suppose it is a little like cell phones as the carriers supposedly don't make much money from the hardware (the phones) but rake it in on the plans.

All well and good for the companies that make ink and cell phone companies that sell plans but what about me, what's best for me?

Well, if you like most of us read about new cameras and other products on websites and in different other media for example magazine's and you have been watching ads and articles about printers it would seem that although in my opinion somewhat slower then cameras, technology is finally catching up with printers.

As some of you may know, the more separate inks you have the better your image will appear of course with other factors as well. But my rule of thumb has always been if I were going to buy one it would have to have a range of a minimum of 6 different colours and I would like to be able to print up to a 13×19 size. Until recently you would have to anticipate spending at least \$500 -\$1000 or more to be able to meet those goals, excluding paper.

Imagine my delight when I found that an EPSON ARTISAN 1430 PRINTER (13") which retails for \$299.00 fulfills all my criteria and can now be bought at many camera stores.
