## President's Message by George Dimitroff Making A Portrait of a Puffin

"The aims of the Society shall be to encourage and develop the skills and increase the expertise of the members in photography and provide fellowship and support for people with similar interests".

For this month's message, I want to try a Before/After theme with puffin photos to demonstrate what was involved in creating portraits with unique subjects. The background behind this story is that we planned a trip to New Brunswick in July 2008 with the goal of visiting a puffin colony in the area of the Bay of Fundy between Grand Manan Island and Maine. The colony is located on tiny Machias Seal Island which is a disputed territory between the US and Canada and therefore manned by two lighthouse keepers from the Canadian Coast Guard in order to protect Canadian sovereignty. Only 15 visitors are allowed from each of Grand Manan and Maine every day when the colony is open to the public. We booked our tickets in January, 6 months ahead of time.

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The trip to the colony was, in my opinion, miserable! The southern half of Grand Manan is extremely foggy and we boarded the fishing tour boat early in the morning and the weather was cool and damp. We all huddled in raincoats for the wretched ride across the Bay of Fundy which took about an hour. It was foggy all the way! If you can imagine these conditions with bumpy waves and no visible horizon; well, you can predict what comes next. As a glorified landlubber. I deposited my breakfast over the side of the boat about halfway into the trip. Yuck! When we arrived at the island, we took a dingy to the wet boulders which served as a landing ramp. Once on the island we got our bearings and were told to follow a boardwalk to the blinds where we were given an hour to take as many pictures as we wanted. We were warned that if we left the blind for any reason, we couldn't return. The experience was wonderful and my emotions changed from misery to joy as we were surrounded by hundreds of puffins. The entire colony consisted of 1300 pairs of puffins that summer. This number is small. compared to other areas of the northern Atlantic but Machias Seal Island provides the closest puffin experience in the world. Just look at any nature or tour guide with puffins on the cover and I can immediately recognize that the picture was made on this island. (continued on page 2)

The first picture shows a close-up of a puffin with a dull sky in the background. The puffin would have been above me or I crouched low to get the uniform background. As my photography matures, I find I become more aware of backgrounds. I look for backgrounds that don't compete with the main subject of the photo, whether the subject is a flower, a person or some object in the foreground. chose this picture as the showcase piece for my first SPARK solo exhibit in April 2014.



Many people talk about dodging and burning of prints in chemicals as the original photo editing. In other words, Ansel Adams did it, so there's nothing wrong in using software to edit your photos. I believe digital photography represents a major technical revolution. There are a few purists who insist on doing the whole shot in the camera and I applaud that approach. There is much merit in learning photography with that goal in mind. However, many modern tools are available to enhance your photos and I believe in using them to achieve the end product of a pleasing and satisfying image. I myself hardly ever edited a photo before 2007 because that was the year I finally decided to try and ended up purchasing Lightroom 1.0 (it was about \$400 at the time). My current philosophy of digital photography is that the camera is a computer which works on the image in your viewfinder or LCD and the software is another computer to further adjust the image to get it to where you want it to be.

When I select a photo for editing, my work flow in Lightroom usually follows these steps: Crop, alter Temperature (white balance) if needed, increase saturation slightly (in Lightroom it's almost always Vibrance which changes colours and not skin), increase the Whites until it just about clips on the right of the histogram, decrease the Blacks until it just about clips on the left of the histogram, increase the Shadows to show some more detail, decrease the Highlights to reduce clipping or achieve a pleasant exposure and finally adjust Sharpness for faces or a more detailed scenic image. I apply most or all of these adjustments to most photos and fine tune them as I view the image and the changes applied. For many photos, the adjustments are minor but for some, especially when I'm going for a special effect, the changes can be profound.

The next step in the work flow is to look closely at the image to identify distracting elements. These can be dust spots, branches, hydro poles and wires or the top of the background roll in the studio. It can also be a bright highlight on a person's face, a distracting mole or uneven makeup or lipstick. These finer details of editing and retouching can be tricky but worth trying to clone out distracting elements. In Lightroom, this is accomplished with the Clone/ Healing Tool. Portrait photography demands a certain level of retouching and I use a Wacom tablet for detailed work (after pulling my hair out trying to follow curves with a mouse).

My developing experience in portrait work led me to clone out some distracting elements in 3 landscape photos which I submitted to SPARK, 2 of which won awards in the Juried Exhibit and the 3rd was the main photo on the SPARK home page for a month. It's all about trying out new things and having fun while doing it.

Back to the puffin photos – my goal for the SPARK exhibit was to choose compelling images and turn them into framed prints for public display. I worked endlessly on these, making dozens of fine adjustments with Lightroom until I was happy with the work. This involved different crops, exposure settings, cloning out tiny marks, sharpening and saturating the puffin's eyes and beaks and so on. I felt like an eccentric artist, working endlessly and being my own biggest critic; starting all over sometimes until it became as close to my vision as possible.

This is the final photo, after end-Lightroom is my only less edits. editing software as I have never used Photoshop (I briefly used Elements 2.0 a long time ago). My goal for this large 32" x 40" print was that it would show good detail, even if you stood close to it. I think this goal was accomplished and the print received numerous compliments when it was displayed as part of the Puffin Collection exhibit at the Peterborough Public Library in April 2014. I decided it would look contemporary and colourful if it was displayed on plaque. I had never used plaque before and was pleased with the result.




I include another Before/After example of how cropping can turn a contextual wildlife image of a puffin in its habitat into another portrait. Many edits were performed on this image but as you can see, the biggest change was the crop. Cropping decreases the amount of pixel information available for the final print, but because my goal was to make large prints, I ended up using the Lightroom Print Module to upscale the number of pixels so that the crop would contain enough information to make as sharp an image as possible.

This is a photo of all 5 prints mounted on plaque at the library. The cropped one is on the far right and it was 24" x 30" on plaque. The photos were hung high to discourage tampering in the public space of the library.

I hope this short essay serves as an example of what can be accomplished with photo editing and provides you with an example of image preparation for public exhibit. Perhaps some of you might consider showing your before and after images in upcoming issues of the Viewfinder or at a PPS.







## Now accepting registrations for free PPS Slideshow Workshop

Hello everyone.

At the regular monthly meeting in March I introduced a photo imaging program called **Fast-Stone** to those of you who were not aware of it. Anyone who wants to have a closer look at it to see if it can help you with your images can download it free at http://www.faststone.org/.

As I explained that evening, **FastStone** can perform a great variety of tasks. However, since it is a free program it can't do quite as much as some of the other software such as **Photoshop**, **Elements**, **Corel Paintshop Pro**, or **Lightroom**. Keep in mind, however, that you have to pay for those other programs. If you begin with FastStone, you might decide to move on to one of the other programs if FastStone can't do everything you want it to do for you.

On the other hand, FastStone does a terrific job on slideshows and it is the program that the Club uses to produce the shows seen every month.

The PPS Executive decided at its March meeting to offer a workshop on FastStone in March or April for members who are looking for a relatively easy way to put together a slideshow for the May 2016 Member Slideshow Program, but don't have the tools to do it, or for anyone else who has an interest in using photo imaging software. (Members are invited to submit a slideshow or video with a theme or story up to 5 minutes in length for the May meeting.)

The workshop will take place **Saturday April 9** at 10 AM at Activity Haven, 180 Barnardo Ave., Peterborough. Everyone is welcome. Pre-Registration is not required, but it would be helpful if you emailed <ggiarrat@gmail.com> as soon as possible if you are attending. There is no minimum or maximum number of people required. 

### Make a Slideshow with FastStone Image Viewer


**FastStone Image Viewer** can make simple slideshows with audio backgrounds and slide transitions. PowerPoint does much more, but its slideshows take longer to make and only PowerPoint 2010 has the option of making self-running shows – that is, shows that run even when the computer being used doesn't have PowerPoint installed.




- 1. Download FastStone Image viewer from http://www.faststone.org/FSViewerDownload.htm
- 2. With FastStone Image Viewer open, go to Create » Slideshow Builder.
- 3. For this exercise ensure the following settings are made in the lower left-hand pane: *Background colour:* black; *Auto-Play Timer:* 5 seconds. There should be ticks in the boxes for *Stretch Small Images, Use Transition Effects* and *Resize*. The *New Size* setting should be 800 x 600 and Quality should be somewhere from 80 to 90. The *Launch slideshow after creation box* should be ticked if you want to see a preview of the show as soon as it is complete.
- 4. If you want to have music playing in the background during the slideshow, have a tick in the *Music* box. Click the ▼ beside the music selector and choose the music file that is to be played. In the Music Selection window there is an option to click on music files to hear them before making your choice. (continued on next page)

- 5. To add pictures, click the Add Files button. Select the files you want to add and then click Open. If the pictures are to come from more than one folder you can add files from one folder and then click Add Files again to choose more pictures from another folder.
- 6. Now sort the pictures into the order for presentation. Do this by dragging them to the left or right on the strip of images. If you want to move a group of images from one place to another, Hold down *Ctrl* while selecting the group. Then release *Ctrl* and drag the group. The place where the picture will be "dropped" when you release the mouse button is indicated by a vertical red line between slides.
- 7. One option is to have a pictorial Slideshow Start window on screen so that it is an easy one-click to start the show when you are ready. It uses the first slide in the show in thumbnail size.





- a) To set this up, in the right-hand pane of the Slide Show Builder window, put a tick in the *Create Initial Window* box. Write a title in the slot provided.
- b) An optional item is a description of the slideshow or other background information. When the Start window is on screen, the text that you have written appears in a scrollable pane that can be read before starting the show.
- c) Click v beside the Cover Image button and choose a style of frame for your Start window.
- d) Optionally you may choose to have a Browse button and/or an Export button on the *Start* window. The *Browse* button displays the set of pictures as a strip of images allowing you to choose amongst them for ones you want to see in full screen view. The *Export* button allows you to save the show as individual files onto the computer that is displaying the presentation.
- 8. The slideshow is now complete. Click the *Create* button. The show is compiled into an EXE file. As with any EXE file, double-clicking on it starts the show. EXE files are often rejected by ISPs as virus risks. So to send it as an email attachment you may first need to zip the file (*Right click on the filename » Send to Compressed zipped folder*). The recipient saves the file and then right-clicks on it and chooses *Extract All* to access the slideshow file.

The final thing you need to know is that FastStone Image Viewer also has *Slideshow* button on its Toolbar, but this has very limited and temporary capability. It merely displays the photos in the current folder, one after the other. The only way to access the true slideshow builder is by clicking *Create* » *Slideshow Maker* on the Menu bar.

# 13 images or 1-minute and 44 seconds of video or a combination adding up to 1:44

Every month, each club member is able to submit up to 13 images OR one video with a running time of approximately 1 minute, 44 seconds (140 seconds) or a combination of images and video which add up to one minute and 44 seconds.


If you are planning to submit a combination of images and video, each image counts as 8 seconds. You could for example submit 4 images (4 x 8 seconds = 32 seconds) and 72 seconds of video. The total would add up to 104 seconds.

When you are making your video, remember to edit it into a story such as a music video or commercial. Add a narrative, music, or just the natural sounds which the scene produces.

Share a trip you are taking with us, some kind of event, or something in nature that for whatever reason you think would be of interest.

But remember, the maximum length of your video can only be one-minute and forty-four seconds, and if you submit that much video, you can't submit any images.
