


Location Challenge By Pat Carpenter

My interest in photography started while on holidays with my Dad. We both enjoyed capturing various images, not anything specific.



My shots for this article are on the subject of Art and Architecture. I hope you find them of interest.
















Photo Essay By Lawrence Wicks

Didi would like to thank Claude Denis and Liz Anderson for their assistance in hanging the show.






