As I am currently out of the country, spending time with my daughters and their families, this message will be shorter than usual.



# Program Notes By Anita Erschen-Pappas

#### **Tilting Away From Gander**

Our guest speaker for January, Bill Lockington, will talk about his adventures to Fogo Island in 2016.

Bill Lockington, a lawyer with his firm LLF Lawyers, in Peterborough, and a co-founder of the SPARK Photo Festival, has been a life-long photographer who teaches, exhibits, and is a frequent contributor to periodicals and publications. His work is exhibited in the Traditional forms of framed prints and large canvasses in a number of private and corporate collections, and in self-published photography books. He has participated in numerous workshops with, among others, noted Canadian photographers Freeman Patterson, Andre Gallant, Lyle McIntyre, and Dennis Minty. Today, Bill teaches digital photography and image editing through the Art School of Peterborough, and has taught at Fleming College's Haliburton School of Fine Art. Travel strongly influences the subject matter of his photography. He enjoys macro work and the pure creative side of the photographic medium. Favourite thoughts on photography are "there are always pictures in the pictures", and "your best pictures are those right around you".

During 2016, Bill enjoyed two separate trips to Fogo Island, Newfoundland and Labrador. One trip, in June, was made in conjunction with his work with Community Foundations of Canada, and the other was as an invited artist to the Tilting Feile Festival in September. Fogo is like a microcosm, a world unto itself - fiercely independent, and yet, so typical of the character and cultures of the wonderful part of Canada.

# Featured Photographer: Dawn Macklin

#### **Bring Out the Beauty and the Bizarre**

My husband, Paul, and I joined PPS at least 12 years ago, and have never looked back. We have thoroughly enjoyed participating in so many club activities, learning so much about photography, and making many wonderful like-minded friends.

I was born in Toronto, where my first contact with photography was looking at photos while my mother would tell me about my dad, who was overseas during the WW2 until I was 4 ½. Daily excursions to High Park guickly developed my love of nature and animals. Family photos were always taken and events recorded so, at eight, when I received my Baby Brownie camera, I was ready to start snapping. Lack of money for film, however, controlled my activity. Growing up in Trenton, I often spent time in the local woods, and one highlight was borrowing my dad's movie camera and recording the hatching of a cicada. In 1967, while I was nursing in ICU at Sick Children's Hospital, and taking candid shots of staff members (using my husband's Yashica), I was asked to take photos of a young cardiac patient, from admission through to discharge. These photos were to be used at a Grand Rounds presentation. Then, I was hooked on photography. Raising our family of 3 and volunteer work kept me mostly away from my camera until the children were grown and on their own. Paul played the biggest role in helping to fill 76 albums of photos until we went digital in 2003.

Travelling spurred my enthusiasm for photography and any trip averaged 15 rolls of film. At the time, I was using a Canon 650. In 2003, while roaming Bonaventure Island in the Gaspe, trying to photograph Gannets in motion and constantly missing wing tips, we realized digital was definitely the way to go and we have never looked back. I started with a Canon 10D, then 20D and now use a Canon 7D Mark II with a Canon 7D as back up. Their settings are so conveniently displayed on the back which makes adjustments easy.

I still haven't narrowed my focus to one or two types of photography, but I love the outdoors, hiking, kayaking, travelling, and gardening, so landscape and wildlife predominate. I am so fascinated by patterns in nature; in rock, in water, trees, and other plants, that I am drawn to close up and abstract to bring out the beauty and the bizarre from things we take for granted. The lens I frequently use is a 15-85mm (versatile and great for travelling), also a 70-200, (my new favourite finding that I can use it for a huge variety of situations not just telephoto) and close up, 100mm. I have a 400 mm lens with an extender which I like but I am limited to using it with a tripod so it has been mostly used at home and at the cottage. Travels have taken us across Canada and to

places like Arizona and western U.S., Hawaii, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, St. Lucia, Belize, Costa Rica, Greece, Italy, and Scotland. I must confess that in every case we are usually seeking the picture rather than being found in the museums. We head down into the canyons or climb to the top of any hill or St. Peter's Cathedral (for a better view), or take the dirt roads rather than the highway. Here at home, Algonquin is a favourite. What I love about photography is that you are really looking at what you see, really feeling it and appreciating what is before you, and living in the moment.

I have just finished taking a course in Photoshop, working with the various settings, layers, and masks. A whole new world is opening up for me to take some of my photography to a more artistic, creative level, not necessarily to record what I see but what I imagine.

We have 3 children and 7 grandchildren, all of whom provide great inspiration for taking photos. I tend to take the 'activity' photos while Paul loves the portrait work. All the family has come to accept seeing us with cameras in hand whenever we have visits and the grandchildren have known that flash since birth. Summers are spent at our cottage on Chandos Lake (since 1971). We have a Hobie 16 catamaran and, while Paul races, I take the race photos for the club which offers me plenty of challenges despite having a stabilizer and opportunity to try to catch and record 'the moment'. We both do a good deal of the photography for our lake yearbook as well, and thoroughly enjoy the chance to become involved with lake activities and events and, consequently, have made wonderful friends, as well. The best of everything for me is that Paul and I share the same interests, especially photography.
