Enduring the Rain, Embracing the Elements

We enjoyed a very interesting and informative presentation in February. Alasdair Gillespie illustrated many ways to incorporate the technical elements of design into photography. He had a wealth of examples from various excursions around the world that showed us that there is not one single way to take a photograph. Also, if we look for certain elements, such as angles and lines, we can learn to see images, through our viewfinder or screen, in a different way.

It is always exciting to view members' images each month. As is the case with the bi-monthly Challenge, we have seen how one particular subject or place can be interpreted in a variety of ways. Into its second year, this successful challenge was brought forward by one of our members, Pat Carpenter.

The Brown Bag images are to be submitted for the March meeting. We've increased the total amount to three images per person, with one being the original contents of the bag.

At the March meeting, Robert Ferguson, our guest speaker, will be presenting a multi-media slideshow entitled "Rhythm of the Seasons". Each year, our 365-day journey around the sun gives us endless possibilities for capturing the beauty of the ever-changing seasons. Most of the images in his presentation were captured within 100 km of his home in Hastings County, but some are from more exotic, distant locales. Prior to his retirement in 2010, Robert worked as a Wildlife Biologist in the Canadian Arctic and in British Columbia. His first experience with digital imaging was in the early 1990s, about 10 years before Canon and Nikon released their first DSLR cameras. At that time, Robert used digital images recorded from the LANDSAT series of satellites to map important wildlife habitats for muskoxen and waterfowl in Canada's North.

Today, his photographic images reflect his life-long interests in the natural world and in the other living creatures that share our planet. Robert enjoys creating multi-media presentations because they give him an opportunity to explore four of his greatest passions: photography, wildlife viewing, nature recordings, and music.

Robert is a new member of our Society this year, and is a 5-year member of the Lanark County Camera Club.

Pileated Woodpecker

I have been searching for a good shot of a pileated woodpecker for years. I've driven all over the province in a vain attempt to get close to one of these elusive birds, but only glimpsed one three times — always fleetingly and never in the clear.

One morning in early February, I looked out my bedroom window and, to my astonishment, saw a pileated woodpecker fly onto a tree trunk right in front of the window. After evading me for so long, luck had found me in my own back yard.

Even more miraculously, the woodpecker stuck around long enough for me to make a dash for my camera and get a dozen shots off. I don't like shooting through windows, but this was not the time to be picky. Fortunately, the bird was close enough, my lens was good enough — and the window was clean enough! — to deliver this prized image.

Colima, Mexico

Colima, a city in Mexico, is famous for its sea salt. It is located in the same place in Mexico where the Aztecs harvested salt more than 500 years ago.

The salt is harvested from small lagoons by salt farmers who are called salineros. They work in the early hours of the day to avoid the intense heat around noon. The salt contains 80-plus minerals, all of which are incredibly good for us, and it is un-refined and free from any toxins. It is dried naturally, under the sun. Having heard how important this industry is to tourism in the area, and how famous it is, I expected it to be a high-tech operation. Not so, as age-old methods are still used.

As we drove by we saw three men working hard with mountains of salt behind them. The piles of salt looked like giant snow banks, open to the elements or only partially covered with thick plastic.

Preparing the bags of salt for sale is an extremely labour-intensive operation, performed manually in the intense heat. It is, perhaps, not overly sanitary, but nevertheless, bags and bags of salt are filled daily, sold in stores and alongside the highway. It can also be ordered on Amazon (is there anything that you can't order on Amazon?) We brought 3 small bags home with us!




