
President's Message cont'd

Smoke Workshop

In the past, when I have shown my presentations on *My Abstract World* and *Abstract and Special Effects*, many members have asked how I make the smoke images. Here is your chance to find out how it is all done.

On November 17th, I will be holding a workshop on Smoke Imaging. The location will be Mike and Lori Cummings' farm. This will be a fun hands-on workshop, so bring your camera and a macro lens, or something in the 18 to 80mm, or similar, lens. If you own a tripod, bring that too, but it's not actually needed.

For Canon and Nikon users everything will be set up for you to start shooting. We will try to accommodate users of other camera brands, but you will have to bring a flash to suit your camera. If you have a flash extension cord or remote triggers to suit your camera bring those too.

As I mentioned, this is going to be a fun day. If we have enough members sign up we plan for a potluck lunch. If not, we can bring our own sandwiches. I will supply bottled water. After lunch we can still do some more smoke photography, or we can go around the farm to shoot some great images. I would like to thank Mike and Lori Cummings for offering to host the workshop, and for the use of their garage and property. Please note, the images shot at this workshop are not for an Outing category, but can be used in the PC category.

The workshop will start at <u>9:30 am on Saturday, the 17th of November at Mike and Lori Cummings' farm.</u> Sign-up sheets will be provided at the September, October, and November meetings. Or please send me an e-mail (ppsphotos@cogeco.ca) if you wish to attend.

THERE WILL BE NO SMOKING ALLOWED AT THE SMOKE WORKSHOP. (I know, it's a bad joke.)



Terry's Tip of the Month

Level Horizons

Most of the time you'll want the horizon in a picture to be level. This is especially true if you're shooting lake scenes or seascapes. Otherwise, the water or horizon will appear tilted and to be running out of the frame.

Some cameras have a grid overlay that can be activated in the eyepiece or live-view screen by searching in the menu. This will ensure that the horizon is level. It may also have an electronic level display that can be superimposed over the image in live view or, as my Nikon has, a level display right in the eyepiece.

The only drawback to using live view all of the time is that it will drain the batteries.

If your camera lacks these features, use the rows of autofocus points that you can see in the viewfinder. Also available is a level bubble gadget that slides into your camera's hotshoe. These should give you a fairly good idea of a straight horizon.





Sixth Street

During the Spring and Summer of this year, I have been travelling to Northport, Michigan. Northport is a small town on Grand Traverse Bay, north of Traverse City, in the State of Michigan. During my travels I explored Traverse City, also. I came across 6th Street and was impressed.

It gave to me the image of what might be said to be a pleasant street in a pleasant American City. I went back to photograph the homes; wishing I could get some history of the street. Later, I happened to pick-up the Traverse City 2018 Visitors Guide. The following description is from that publication.

"Traverse City's most elegant thoroughfare is Sixth Street, known a century ago as "Silk Stocking Row," lined with graceful Victorian homes and tall shady trees, and paved with dark red bricks that came as ballast in the holds of sailing ships. At the end of the nineteenth century this was the preferred residential street for the city's commercial and manufacturing elitemost notably Traverse City Founder Perry Hannah, whose statue in Hannah Park marks the street's eastern end and whose imposing 1891 mansion set the tone for the rest of the neighborhood.

"The Hannah House (now a funeral home) has more than 40 rooms (each paneled in a different wood) and ten fireplaces. Across the street is the imposing Carnegie Library built in 1904, now home to the CROOKED TREE ARTS CENTRE. But there are splendid homes up and down the street for six blocks, all the way to Division. Unlike the older neighborhood along Washington, Sixth Street was a "planned community" whose houses were all sited the same distance from the street. Most of them - especially those closest to Hannah's amazing Victorian confection - were built in the exuberant Queen Anne style with lots of gingerbread, gables, towers and turrets. There is, for instance, the 1894 home of former city clerk Charles Beers at 213 Sixth, the lovely "honeymoon cottage" at 501 Sixth, built in 1892, and the 1886 Cuyler Germain house at 333 Sixth.
