Terry's Tip of the Month by Terry Carpenter

Fall Colour and Nature's Soft Box

An overcast day is the best lighting you can have for photographing fall colours. On these dull days it is like a giant diffuser to soften the light. Colours have a vibrancy without the annoying shadows, and also a light drizzle, or right after a rain, can help produce vibrant and saturated colours. By using a polarizer, you can get rid of distracting reflections. On these cloudy days, a bland sky doesn't help your photograph, so try to leave the sky out of the photo. Use a polarizer to give punch to your image, and a warming filter can make the fall colours glow.

The use of a tripod can greatly improve your photography on cloudy days, not just for a steady base, but also for composing your image. Purchase the best tripod you can afford. When I'm photographing a colourful fall scene, I like to mount the camera after I have searched around, looking through the view finder to get that perfect image. Then I mount the camera to the tripod to finally compose my image. After getting a shot that you like, remove the camera from the tripod and keep looking. A great fall colour scene seldom has only one photo opportunity.

Story Behind the Photo by Guy Ridgway

This image was captured and processed using techniques developed, and still taught, by Mr. Ross of Harold Ross Fine Art Photography, in Pennsylvania.

These days I'm spending more time contemplating what makes a good composition and gradually getting back into the light-sculpting groove to try to create compelling images. This one took about 2.5 hours to shoot. It is the result of a total of 65 photographs, of which only 31 were used to make the final result. The exposure for each of the 65 photos averaged about 10 seconds.

As for the composition elements, all pieces except for the fabric, the seashell, and the leaves were acquired from antique shops, with the exception of the anniversary clock; that item was presented to Caroline's parents as a wedding gift in 1956. The maple leaves originate from what, for me, is a rather special place in Algonquin Provincial Park.

Still-life photography has led me along paths I would otherwise never have considered. No one could have convinced me two years ago that very soon I'd gladly take up "antiquing" in search of the perfect vintage candle holder or set of old eyeglasses, or especially hunting for material at our local fabric store. But there you have it.

Smoke Workshop

In the past, when I have shown my presentations on *My Abstract World* and *Abstract and Special Effects*, many members have asked how I make the smoke images. Here is your chance to find out how it is all done.

On November 17th, I will be holding a workshop on Smoke Imaging. The location will be Mike and Lori Cummings' farm. This will be a fun hands-on workshop, so bring your camera and a macro lens, or something in the 18 to 80mm, or similar, lens. If you own a tripod, bring that too, but it's not actually needed.

For Canon and Nikon users everything will be set up for you to start shooting. We will try to accommodate users of other camera brands, but you will have to bring a flash to suit your camera. If you have a flash extension cord or remote triggers to suit your camera bring those too.

As I mentioned, this is going to be a fun day. If we have enough members sign up we plan for a potluck lunch. If not, we can bring our own sandwiches. I will supply bottled water. After lunch we can still do some more smoke photography, or we can go around the farm to shoot some great images. I would like to thank Mike and Lori Cummings for offering to host the workshop, and for the use of their garage and property. Please note, the images shot at this workshop are not for an Outing category, but can be used in the PC category.

The workshop will start at <u>9:30 am on Saturday, the 17th of November at Mike and Lori Cummings' farm.</u> Sign-up sheets will be provided at the September, October, and November meetings. Or please send me an e-mail (ppsphotos@cogeco.ca) if you wish to attend.


A map and further instructions will be provided to those who are attending.
