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
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

Terry's Tip of the Month by Terry Carpenter

Shooting Christmas Lights

With the holidays fast approaching, it is the perfect time to take your camera out to capture some of those outdoor Christmas decorations. Almost every street in the city has an overzealous Christmas light expert. Photographers love these guys.

If you are trying to hand-hold, the first thing that you will really need to consider is your shutter speed. You do not want to set it too slow, but you might need to keep a low aperture and a higher ISO than you normally would. This is especially advisable when you are trying to capture flashing Christmas lights.

I would highly recommend the use of a tripod, as your shutter speed may be too slow for you to hand-hold your camera and still get a sharp image. Set your ISO to 400 or lower. This will prevent loss of photo quality. Also, play with your f-stop or exposure compensation to get those dark backgrounds and bright, crisp lights.

Before going out, decide what type of light photography you want. A wide-angle lens is great for those overall images of houses lit up. If you are going to single out individual lights, then a small telephoto or a macro lens is ideal for those close-ups of lights on trees, etc.

A good time to shoot Christmas lights is at dusk, just before it gets totally dark. This will give some detail in the background or on the house.

On some cameras you can go to some of the auto settings, such as night-time setting, etc. Just experiment for different images, and you might be surprised by how the images come out.

Consider your composition, such as what you are photographing, and what you want to convey through your image. Try to fill the frame with your subject and avoid those dark, point-less areas of black.

I know I have always pushed using a tripod, but now, put it back in the trunk of your car. Set your settings to a low ISO and high f-stop, so you have a low shutter speed. Now go back and zoom your lens or twirl your camera for those abstract images. I love taking this kind of photograph. You never know what you will get.
