

Terry's Tip of the Month By Terry Carpenter

5 Tips for Better Landscapes

1 Shoot in the Golden Hours

Shooting in the early morning or late afternoon light will give you more dramatic images, giving you better edge definition, better separation, longer shadows, and an overall glow to your pictures.

2 Use Filters

If I could only use one filter for my photography it would be a polarizing filter. These filters don't cost an arm and a leg, costing anywhere from \$30 to \$130. Get the best you can afford and if you are shooting with an auto focus lens make sure to buy a CPL filter (Circular Polarizing Filter).

This filter will increase the vibrancy in blue skies, take the shine from foliage, and make white, fluffy clouds pop. It will also reduce reflections in water. Normally a polarizer will take up to two stops from your exposure. This can be handy when trying to make a waterfall into a milky streaming effect. Just set your ISO to its lowest setting, then adjust your aperture to its highest setting, maybe f22. This will now give you the slowest shutter speed available for your shot, and with the filter screwed to your lens it will now reduce it by two extra stops. It is most advisable to use a tripod for this kind of image.

3 Always Check Composition

The use of a tripod will always be helpful when checking your composition. Compose your shot, then lock your tripod to make adjustments and install filters, etc, and your composition will remain the same. Look for complimentary foreground material and check for unwanted items such as twigs etc. The rule of thirds can be a big help but not always necessary.

4 Don't Worry About Gear

Landscape photography can be shot with any photographic equipment you have. Expensive gear doesn't mean better images. A great image is a great image and expensive cameras don't make beautiful images; <u>you do</u>. I will add though, try to purchase the best lenses you can afford. I feel money spent on lenses, rather than cameras, will always help your photography.

5 Confidence and Experience

Confidence is key. Every photograph you take and every mistake you make will improve your photography. Learn from your not-so-great images, and ask yourself what would make this image better. As you shoot more and gain experience, you will become more proficient.

Experience is so valuable, and as I used to say when I did workshops, the best way to learn photography is to waste film. Of course that is different now with digital, but the idea still stands. The more images one takes, and with each mistake and each picture deleted, you can consider yourself one step closer to being a great photographer.

One last hint is ask questions and listen to photographers who have been around for awhile and remember: **Keep on Shooting**
