## **A Truly Great Fall Photo**

For the last few weeks I have been out West, mostly in Saskatoon, both visiting and taking care of family. It was both busy and stressful, leaving little time to do photography. But, I did get out one day to shoot the North Saskatchewan River in its fall colours. It was then that I realized how lucky we are here in Ontario, where you can go out in an afternoon and shoot hundreds of photos with little effort. I quickly realized that I would have to slow right down to my zen-type self in order to visualize how to show an environment that is both very plain yet complex, colours that are not vivid, but soft and subtle. It also brought me back to my past, growing up out there in the prairies when life was not so busy and fast, but slow and subtle.

Back here in Ontario, I was shocked to find myself again in this forest of colour and trying to figure out what to point my camera at next. Which made me think of the basic steps I need to take to get that truly great fall photo.

Here are a few tips from -45 West, The Adorama Learning Centre:

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- 1. Use a polarizer for rich colors. Rain days also make for richer colours.
- 2. Composition can sometimes make the image.
- Macro shots.
- 4. Fall is not just about leaves.
- 5. Capture a playful, yet, captivating moment.
- 6. Play with reflections.
- 7. Change your perception! Look up, way up ...
- 8. Set up a scene.
- 9. Create fall abstracts.
- 10. Timing is everything. Morning or evening.
- 11. Zoom in on interesting landscapes.
- 12. Take a scenic route.
- 13. Look for complimentary colours and contrasts.
- 14. Play with different exposures.
- 15. Make different lens choices. Wide angle, close ups, anyone?

As always, don't just snap away; think, look, feel, experience, live it - and then photograph.

## Program Notes By Guy Ridgway

#### October Speaker

Extraordinary! Dave Ellis's presentation on our local wildlife left us with such a clear understanding of how he captures his subjects and what it really takes to get such winning photos. Not only did we learn of the incredible variety of species one can find close to home, but also his recommendations for the equipment and the settings he uses in his craft. His suggestions were to switch to manual rather than any program or semi-auto mode, use a high ISO of 1600 for an average cloudy day, prefer an f8 to f10 aperture range for sharpness, and a 1/1600 shutter speed (between dawn and dusk) to freeze motion. And, of course, he uses an image-stabilized 600 mm lens. There were so many images to present and so many questions he answered throughout the talk, it felt a shame to have to limit his time to a single hour.

We will definitely hope to have Dave make a future appearance for an updated version of his engaging presentation.

Thanks again to Dave for an amazing show.

#### **November Speaker**

Our speaker for November will be Randall Romano. Randall is an accomplished street photographer, covering a subject that often appears easier than it really is. This will be a two-part presentation spread over two meetings:

<u>Part 1</u>: "Creating Meaningful Photographs", will be presented on the evening of November 5th, and will be about roadblocks to achieving great images.

In Randall's own words, "Ordinary photographs are easy to create, with the availability and widespread use of smart phones. In contrast, great photographs are difficult to make, they require care and hard work to craft."

Much of Randall's presentation will emphasize the work of master photographers in order to better illustrate how to overcome roadblocks.

<u>Part 2</u>: "Street Photography", will be presented on January 7th, and will cover the art of creating compelling street images in today's more restrictive environment. Randall will cover everything from the meaning of Documentary Street Photography to types of street photography, techniques, subject matter, and the street photographer's rights under Canadian law.

The show can only contain five images, plus one title slide and one ending slide for a total of seven slides. They can be put to music or you can talk about them. They can be made into a slide show or presented individually, so long as it doesn't contain more than five images.

Once completed, submit the images or slide show through the Dropbox link, "Member Slideshows & Video Submissions on the web site. **Please make your submission no later than midnight, November 26**.




