Most of my focus for this was Little Lake, which turned out to be most rewarding with all the birds showing up as the ice melted away. 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It has proven to be quite a busy spot for birds, as I have seen the Redhead Ducks, Long-Tail Duck, Ring-necked Duck, Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, Common Merganser, Swan, and what I think might be a Horned Grebe, not to mention Red-winged Black Birds, Gulls, Crows, and so many more. The effort to get out and pick a project like birds is so rewarding in many ways. For me it's the mental rewards from spending time outside with nature... better then any drugs on the market by far.





<u>March Speaker – Don Komarechka</u>

Macro Photography: The Universe at Our Feet

Don's astounding presentation, "*Macro Photography: The Universe at Our Feet*", provided a compelling view into the work of a top-flight macro photographer, covering everything from special techniques and equipment to his unique thought processes that allow him to capture such breathtaking images of the very small. The "very small" includes anything from water droplets posed on the petals of a flower to a single delicate snowflake.

Especially intriguing was his use of UV light to draw out incredible patterns from crystallized compounds or from common flowers.

He showed that it's not so difficult to create a makeshift polarizing microscope or simply use a polarizing filter over a smartphone screen to get captivating images of menthol crystals.

Don's presentation was about a journey through the trials and errors and the spectacular successes he has achieved from photographically weaving jaw-dropping canvasses from a mesh of science and art.

Michelle Valberg is a world renowned award-winning Canadian photographer and explorer who has been telling stories with her camera for more than 30 years.

Michelle finds art in all of nature's most intimate moments and is known for her unique ability to make relatable images of unimaginable landscapes. Michelle has exhibited her works internationally as a Canadian Nikon Ambassador. In 2011, her work was the subject of a critically acclaimed, three-month solo exhibition at the Canadian Museum of Nature. Her images appear on magazine covers and in numerous exhibitions and embassies worldwide.

Her iconic image of a Nunavut drum dancer appears on a Royal Canadian Mint coin, while her images of bears are featured on three Canada Post stamps, both first day cover and booklet. Michelle has been awarded the Louise Kamookak Medal from the Royal Canadian Geographic Society.

Michelle was named the first Canadian Geographic Photographer-in-Residence and she has self-published four books: Look Beyond...The Faces & Stories of People Living with HIV/AIDS; Dare to Dream... A Celebration of Canadian Women; Arctic Kaleidoscope...The People, Wildlife and Ever-Changing Landscape; and her children's book, Ben & Nuki Discover Polar Bears.

Michelle is a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographic Society and an International Fellow of the Explorer's Club in New York City.

Submitting Photos for Slide Shows

The following is the information you need to submit images for the Monthly slideshows at www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com

If you have any questions, suggestions or comments about the slideshow, including the music, please let me know at photos@peterboroughphotographicsociety.com

Members may submit up to three images each for monthly Theme, six images for Photographer's Choice, and up to three images for each Outing. Please note that the Theme images should be shot within the current year of the club. The deadline for submitting your images is always the Tuesday before the meeting, at midnight.

Before submitting your images they must be titled and re-sized as instructed below. Images must be JPEGs. First, select the images you wish to submit into the PPS Categories, and copy them into a folder. Re-size your images: If the image is landscape orientation (wider than tall) make the width 1024 pixels and let the height float. If portrait, make the height 768 pixels and let the width float. Correct sizing greatly improves the appearance of image titles. No cropping is required. After re-sizing them give each image a simple title, such as "Lift Locks At Sunset.jpg". DO NOT ADD YOUR NAME (the system will automatically put your name on the image for our presentation).

Go to http://www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com/, then to HOME, then to IMAGE SUBMISSIONS, and then to DROPBOX LINKS FOR IMAGE SUBMISSIONS. The first link you will see on this page is "Preparing Images or Video for Club Slideshows". Please click on this to find out all you need to know to submit images. Now, go back to the DROPBOX LINKS FOR IMAGE SUBMISSIONS page. Scrolling down the page you will see all the categories we use: Theme, Photographer's Choice, Breakfast Outings and Regular Outings, Member Slideshows and Video Submissions, Miscellaneous Files, and Brown Bag. Here you will also see a brief description of each category. Also, you will see each category highlighted in blue. This will be the link to click on to submit your images. Click on the blue link and this will take you to a Dropbox page asking you to choose your files. Click this icon and it will open a page where you can select the images you wish to submit (you do not need a Dropbox account and do not need to Sign In to Dropbox).

Members must not attempt to submit folders of images, even though Dropbox presents that as an option. Highlight your selected images and click on "Open" at the bottom right hand corner of the pop-up. This will direct you to a page showing you which category you have selected, will show you the images you have selected, and ask you for your name and e-mail. After typing this information click on Upload at the bottom of the page. And that is all there is to it. I know in print it sounds like a lot, but in reality it is very quick and smooth. Now, close the page and go to the next category and repeat the instructions.

SUBMISSION MUSTS: Please read and try to keep these four simple guidelines in mind when submitting your images each month.

SUBMISSION DEADLINE: Images must be submitted before midnight on the Tuesday one week before the monthly meeting. Images submitted after this time may not be included in the slideshow.

Winter Photography

One of the joys of winter photography is the abundance of clear backgrounds. Snow, for me, provides the opportunity for simple images. This allows an item to pop out from the picture.

While driving down to Millbrook this week, I spotted this wonderful hand-carved dog. It is about three feet tall and made of hardwood with a beautiful grain. It was also on a white snowy lawn. Eureka!

On arriving home, I put it on the screen and cropped it. I like the big, open space to the left as it appears that the dog is looking that way. For further post-processing I cloned out some spots on the snow, and I then adjusted the white balance to brighten up the white stuff. Finally I selected the carving itself and brought out the detail in the wood.

This makes a great desktop background as all the icons are on the right.

Light Box Photography

The Pandemic has forced us all to change our way of living and passing the time. Photographers should not go out and shoot in groups and the winter weather tends to put a chill in our photographic vim and vigour.

I enjoy doing indoor studio macro photography. I thought I would take on a new and different project. Harold Davis is a professional photographer who has championed back-lit light box photography to get interesting results. He also uses conversions to Lab Colour to get further effects.

I ordered some dried flowers from Amazon. They cost about \$30. I have an old slide sorter that has been idle for some time. It worked as my strong white back light. I laid it on the floor and set the camera up to shoot directly down at the light source. I arranged the dried flowers on a sheet of glass. Each flower is no larger than 1" in diameter. I laid another piece of glass over the flowers to hold them in place, otherwise they would have blown away with the slightest breath. About seven exposures were taken favouring the lightest exposures. These were brought into Lightroom and opened in Photoshop as layers.

In Photoshop, the layers were combined using several Layer Masks to combine the best information for all the flowers from the lightest to the darkest. A bit of Curves and some Dodging and Burning and the image was complete.

The next two images were derived from the first image by changing the Colour Space from RGB to Lab Colour (Image > Mode > Lab Colour). Lab Colour has three channels. The "L" Channel is Lightness. The "a" Channel is Magenta – Green. The "b" Channel is "Blue – Yellow".

I selected the "L" Channel and then produced the second image by doing an inversion on this channel by selecting only this channel and Inversion (Image > Adjustments > Invert). This produced the second image.

For the final image, I selected all the channels and then did an inversion on all the channels by selecting all the channels and Inversion (Image > Adjustments > Invert). This produced the third image.

After some fine-tuning and time, I was pleased with the results. I don't think they are anything special, but they are something different and provided an interesting challenge.







Featured Photographer

Erin Burrell

I was born in North York, Toronto, but I was raised in Orangeville, a small town (at the time) about an hour north-west of Toronto. Growing up, I remember being so fascinated with the feelings that came to me when looking at photos

My mother had many photos from when my siblings and I were kids. I would love it when we pulled out the photo albums and reminisced about the memories. I also enjoyed taking photos with my mom's Canon film camera. It was then that I began to understand the power of photography.

Through high school, my interest flourished when I took communications technology. It was there that I learned the basics of Photoshop, among other things. I also had the opportunity to take part in the creation of the school's year-book when I was in grade 11.

When it came time to choose my path after high school, I convinced myself that photography, to me, was a hobby. I didn't think of it as a career choice. In 2008, I began my college career at Humber in the Child and Youth Worker Program. I chose this program because, as I learned in photography, I had a passion for helping others. I continued taking photos as a hobby. I had a Fuji bridge camera that I loved to use to take nature and landscape photos. I graduated in 2011 and began my job in residential treatment as a counsellor.

After a couple of years, the stress of the job took a toll on me so I stopped working there. Throughout this time I was working at the pool as a life guard and swim instructor. I fell back on that and turned to recreation as another career choice. I enrolled in Humber again in 2013 for Recreation and Leisure studies.







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I continued to travel during that time, going to places such as Dominican Republic, Michigan, Las Vegas, and China. All of these trips I photographed and they continue to hold special memories for me. By this point, I had acquired the Canon Rebel 3Ti. It was the first DSLR I had ever had. The most memorable trip for me was to Newfoundland in 2014.

My grandmother (she was known to me as "Nanny", for anyone who is from the Rock) was born in Newfoundland. When I arrived there with my best friend, one thing led to another and we connected with relatives that I never knew about. They were so happy to see me, and so welcoming. They took me to Keels, a small village where my Nanny was born. I took pictures of the place, thinking I was just going to do another scrapbook. When I returned home, I showed the photos to my mom, and she went into her albums and pulled out an album from the last time she was in Keels, more than 35 years earlier. I paused on one photo that she had, depicting water spraying up between the rocks on the shoreline. I compared it to a photo I took on my trip and sure enough, I was standing in pretty well the same spot my mother had. Again, I was seeing the power of photography and its impact on our lives.

In 2015, I was asked by my best friend to take photos of her getting ready for her wedding. It was my first time ever doing this sort of thing, so I started watching Youtube videos and reading articles. I never thought of shooting professionally, as I've always done it as a hobby. After the wedding, I was approached by another friend of a friend who asked me to photograph her friend's wedding, as the photographer had backed out. It was my first full-length wedding. I was nervous, but again I worked through it. I slowly started getting more bookings over the years.

I up-graded to a Canon 6D and a Canon M5 mirrorless camera. I started shooting various projects, and this enabled me to start my own business.





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In 2016, I met Andrew, who is now my husband. While we were dating, he learned very quickly that I always kept my camera with me and to be prepared to pull over at any time I saw a bird or other creature while we were out. He introduced me to the world of Jeep enthusiasts and off-roading. He was always game to find a new location to explore to give me an opportunity to take photos.

In 2017, I took a job as the Assistant Aquatic Coordinator at the City of Kawartha Lakes, and moved to Peterborough permanently. Shortly after moving, I was contacted by a magazine based in Lindsay, Ontario called the Lindsay Advocate. They were looking for a photographer and came across my work. I agreed and I've been proudly part of their team for 4 years and counting. I credit the Advocate with helping me get to know the Kawarthas, learning about the community, and using photography to get there.

In 2018, I got engaged on the beach in Daytona while on another road trip. I spent most of this trip taking pictures of all the modified jeeps that were on display. Andrew has always been a major supporter and advocate for my photography. He is my biggest fan and I will be forever grateful. I was married in 2019 after the birth of my daughter Chloe. I spent most of 2019 photographing her. Throughout this time, I still shot on a part-time basis, mostly family portraits and jeep adventures. In 2020, I was hired by EH Media to photograph the TMR Customs offroad race series. These are heavily modified offroad rigs bombing through the bushes. The photography is fun as things are changing constantly, but it's the people I meet who keep me coming back!

I joined the Peterborough Photographic Society in 2019 to learn more about photography and to get to know Peterborough. It's been wonderful listening to the speakers and getting to know all the wonderful people who are a members of this group.

As with many businesses, I took a break, as COVID had been hard on me. Life at the pool has ramped up and with a toddler running around, I haven't had much time to pick up my camera. For the first time in months, I took a picture of the moon. I felt the same spark I get whenever I'm out shooting. I still plan to shoot the races this up-coming summer (COVID permitting). In addition, Andrew and I expect to have our 2nd child in September. With a lot coming up, I'm sure there will be more stories to capture and more memories to preserve.





Photo Contest!
