## **Submitting Photos for Slide Shows**

The following is the information you need to submit images for the Monthly slideshows at <a href="https://www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com">www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com</a>

If you have any questions, suggestions or comments about the slideshow, including the music, please let me know at photos@peterboroughphotographicsociety.com

Members may submit up to three images each for monthly Theme, six images for Photographer's Choice, and up to three images for each Outing. Please note that the Theme images should be shot within the current year of the club. The deadline for submitting your images is always the Tuesday before the meeting, at midnight.

Before submitting your images they must be titled and re-sized as instructed below. Images must be JPEGs. First, select the images you wish to submit into the PPS Categories, and copy them into a folder. Re-size your images: If the image is landscape orientation (wider than tall) make the width 1024 pixels and let the height float. If portrait, make the height 768 pixels and let the width float. Correct sizing greatly improves the appearance of image titles. No cropping is required. After re-sizing them give each image a simple title, such as "Lift Locks At Sunset.jpg". DO NOT ADD YOUR NAME (the system will automatically put your name on the image for our presentation).

Go to <a href="http://www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com/">http://www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com/</a>, then to HOME, then to IMAGE SUBMISSIONS, and then to DROPBOX LINKS FOR IMAGE SUBMISSIONS. The first link you will see on this page is "Preparing Images or Video for Club Slideshows". Please click on this to find out all you need to know to submit images. Now, go back to the DROPBOX LINKS FOR IMAGE SUBMISSIONS page. Scrolling down the page you will see all the categories we use: Theme, Photographer's Choice, Breakfast Outings and Regular Outings, Member Slideshows and Video Submissions, Miscellaneous Files, and Brown Bag. Here you will also see a brief description of each category. Also, you will see each category highlighted in blue. This will be the link to click on to submit your images. Click on the blue link and this will take you to a Dropbox page asking you to choose your files. Click this icon and it will open a page where you can select the images you wish to submit (you do not need a Dropbox account and do not need to Sign In to Dropbox).

Members must not attempt to submit folders of images, even though Dropbox presents that as an option. Highlight your selected images and click on "Open" at the bottom right hand corner of the pop-up. This will direct you to a page showing you which category you have selected, will show you the images you have selected, and ask you for your name and e-mail. After typing this information click on Upload at the bottom of the page. And that is all there is to it. I know in print it sounds like a lot, but in reality it is very quick and smooth. Now, close the page and go to the next category and repeat the instructions.

**SUBMISSION MUSTS**: Please read and try to keep these four simple guidelines in mind when submitting your images each month.

**SUBMISSION DEADLINE**: Images must be submitted before midnight on the Tuesday one week before the monthly meeting. Images submitted after this time may not be included in the slideshow.

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## Memberships by Linda Cardona

#### Memberships

Last August the Executive was concerned. What if no one showed up?

Guy Ridgway had planned a great program for the fall, but honestly, we had no idea if anyone would re-join PPS. We joked that it may just be the seven of us. What if people couldn't figure out Zoom? So, we hosted several sessions to teach people how to use the app. Then, we waited, and then we were thrilled – almost every person renewed their membership and we even got some new members! As time went on, it became apparent that we would have to extend our Zoom-based meetings – it would not be safe to meet during the entire 20/21 season. The executive voted to increase the budget for speakers. We normally have six speakers per year, but we needed ten. We were excited about the quality of the speakers that we could get and that they could be located anywhere, not just locally. This came at a cost but, of course, we were experiencing extraordinary circumstances.

Because we honestly had no idea if members would attend speaker sessions on Zoom, we offered a membership renewal discount; people could pay anywhere within a range (\$20.00 - \$50.00). Again, we were thrilled that almost 70% of members paid the full membership fee.

Now we are planning the 21/22 season. We feel that we've learned a lot in the past year. First, we learned the value of loyalty. The members of PPS are amazingly loyal and we appreciate everyone who joined us on-line for the 20/21 season. Our next season is also an unknown – we have decided to be on-line with speakers for the fall, and then, hopefully, meet in-person again starting in January. No matter if we are online or in-person we will incur real costs (speakers' fees while on-line and rent / insurance fees when in-person).

The executive has made the decision to put our fees back to the pre-pandemic rates:

\$50.00 per individual \$75.00 per couple \$20.00 per student

Although fees are due in September, we will start collecting remittances for the 2021/22 season in June. Again, we want to thank everyone for staying with us and venturing through these extraordinary times together. We are a very strong club.

#### **Bird Photography**

Birding is a great activity that anyone can enjoy. Whether you're just looking to spot a new species, admire them up close, or keep a running tally on all you see; birding is a fun and exciting pastime. Join the birding community, and bring your Nikon camera, binoculars, or field scope along for the adventure!

#### The birder's top 5 photography tips.

- **1.** Birds don't like being approached, so view them through binoculars or use a camera with a telephoto lens to take photos.
  - 2. Include part of the bird's natural environment in the image.
- **3.** Bring the birds to you put a bird feeder for song birds or humming-birds in your yard to draw them closer.
- **4.** Photographing birds in flight? Set the camera to Continuous Shooting mode for a quick series of images.
- **5.** Focus in on details like the eye of a peacock feather or the talons of a hawk or eagle.

## Milky Way Photography

#### Part One of Two

(Please Note: Henry wrote this article as a reminder to himself regarding the steps he took when he began to take photographs of the Milky Way. If you have any questions regarding these notes, please contact Henry.)

#### Research

Find a dark sky location with good foreground features with a southern exposure Check for a date when there is a new moon or when the moon rises and sets Locate position of the milky way on that date South, Southwest, or Southeast Check for clear sky on that date

Check sunset time. Start shooting after twilight when completely dark

#### **Equipment and Gear**

Camera: Full-frame is best, but sub-full frame is OK

Lens: Wide angle and fast lens best, with aperture of f1.4 to f2.8

**Tripod** 

Cable release or Intervalometer or Self Timer

Red Head Lamp, Lens Warmer

Hand warmers, plus tape, elastic, or sock tube

Camera bubble level or level in camera

Chair, Bug Spray, Munchies

Pano Gear: L Bracket, Nodal Slider, Pano Head

Lamp for Light Painting + 1/2 CTO Filter — Paint from Side

#### **Preparation**

Pre-zoom lens to widest angle and tape down with gaffer's tape

Pre-focus lens during the day and tape down with gaffer's tape

Set to Manual Focus

Remove filter from front of lens

Tape over camera-activity light (Optional)

Turn down LCD Display to dimmest setting

Learn your camera controls so that you can find and operate them in the dark

Attach a cable release or Intervalometer

Put level on camera or use internal level or tripod level

#### Set Up - General, Initial

File : Raw WB: 4200

Noise Reduction: Long Exposure noise reduction off / High ISO noise reduction off

Exposure Mode: Manual

Frame: Single

Aperture: f2.8 or maximum on lens

Shutter: NPF calculation

ISO: 3200 - 6400 or higher if needed for histogram

Magnifier: 12 x on custom button #3

Focus: On bright light at a distance - Sharp Star?


Manual - Magnify image - Tape down focus

Tripod: Set up and Level


Pano: Find Nodal Point, set click stops, set up sweep

Bright Mon on custom button #4

Histogram: Some breathing room on the left



**Good Exposure** 



Poor Exposure

#### **Options for Capture**

1. Single Frame for sky and land

Set exposure for sky - Land will be dark - Use noise reduction in editing

2. Separate Frame for sky and land

One exposure for land earlier at twilight

Or one exposure for the land at the same time, 2 stops more exposure time

With one exposure for sky

3. Multiple Frames - duplicated later and 1/2 used for sky and 1/2 used for land

Multiple exposures exposed for the sky

Initial processing in Lightroom. Open as layers in Photoshop. Process for sky and land.

4. Multiple Frames

Processed in Sequator to reduce noise

Use black frames between sets of groups of images

5. Multiple Frames, vertically in two row pano. Increases data and reduces noise.

Set up with pano head in vertical orientation

Use a fast prime lens 25 - 50 mm, f1.4 to 1.8

Set aperture 1 to 2 stops down (about 2.8) to prevent vignetting

Set lens at Nodal Point if close to foreground objects

Take 2 rows with 5 - 6 shots in each, with at leasts 50% overlap

Take Black frames to separate groups


## **Photo Contest!**
