

President's Message

Winter

It was during our cold (-18C) Lang Pioneer Village night-time outing back in December 2019, when a few of us ducked into the warmth of their Agricultural Heritage building. I found that my lens fogged heavily when we ventured back outside. Having packed a couple of hand warmers, I had the idea to take one out of my glove and hold it under the front end of the lens. It cured the problem instantly.

Such tricks some times come to mind by necessity, but mostly through talking about winter photography with fellow imagers or reading about them on-line.

Some of us try to get away to more clement locales this time of year, but if the pandemic is limiting your travel plans why not take advantage of what winter has to offer photographically? I'll admit I often prefer the warmth of the studio, but I do find winter scenes compelling, and I like to try my hand at them.

Just recently my wife, Caroline, and I made two forays to try to get some unique winter captures – one to the Port Hope West Beach and the other to the PPS outing at the Lindsay Old Mill ruins. Each location presented its own set of seasonal challenges. The winds gusted to 57 k.m./hr at the beach and the temperature in Lindsay hovered around -25C. Of course, both experiences got me thinking about winter landscape photography in general (and why I was doing this!).

How to dress for winter conditions has been covered in past editions of The Viewfinder, and there's plenty to find on the internet, but I'd like to talk about an on-line Photography Life article, "How to Photograph Winter Landscapes", I came across that puts more emphasis on the art of winter photography than it does on how to stay warm (although that's also covered).

The article talks about preparation, planning, composition, colour, and quality of light. I like to try to have a vision of what I hope to capture. Winter is a great time to shoot a high-key or negative-space image. Most of the look comes right from the RAW file itself, without a lot of post processing (and I find the free Nik Collection 2012 app, Silver Efex Pro 2, works well in post for this). I always take a tripod and think in advance about my camera's manual settings.

Plan your outing immediately after a significant snowfall. As I'm writing this, we've just received a 35 cm dump of snow. Once I can count on ploughed country roads, I'll be heading out to catch trees on a snow-covered hill (with or without shadows), a low sun through trees casting snow shadows, or a farmer's laneway in a classic 'S' curve for a monochromatic high-key shot. That much snow easily covers so many otherwise distracting landscape features.

The article talks about when to use a wide-angle lens to emphasize the foreground, how to consider the use of colour, considering the tonality of the winter landscape and how "snow softens strong tones and highlights the otherwise less visible pastel colors". It covers how to shoot directly into a rising or setting sun over the cold scene before you, making that light the principal subject.

Perhaps we can talk about our own winter experiences in an on-line "Let's Talk Photography" get-together. I hope to see you there.

I'll be heading out soon to catch a high-key winter scene. I'll just grab a couple of charged batteries to keep warm in my pocket before I go.

January Speaker - Marianna Armata: Winter Whimsy +

When I first saw Marianna's extraordinary portfolios, I was struck by the novelty of what lay before me. Her work was comprised of so many individual and unique styles that I had the feeling one could easily identify the artist by any one of them. This is what she brought to us through her enthralling presentation "Winter Whimsey +".

Apropos for the season, Marianna's videos, her narrative, and her images left us awestruck and wanting more. Yet her approach was very down to earth, as she explained how she used simple materials and lighting techniques to turn her visions into magical photographs. This way, she readily inspired us to go out and experiment with objects and techniques that turn out to be challenging, but still accessible to photographers at any level.

Do you want to try your hand at frozen soap bubbles? Marianna gave us the formula for the magic mixture and provided detailed instructions for creating tiny masterpieces (Formula: white corn syrup: 85 ml, clear dish soap: 85 ml, (Brita) filtered water: 250 ml, white sugar: 1 tsp. Outdoor: Temp below -5C, no wind.). Our own Anita Pappas has since created some wonderful examples, which can be seen on **her Facebook page**.






The Challenge By Brian Crangle


The February Challenge is the railroad bridge just south of the No Frills store and north of Holiday Inn, Peterborough.

Before and After By Terry Carpenter

I don't normally do a lot of post processing of my images, other than the usual contrast, sharpening, adjustments, etc. But, every now and again I will take a picture such as this monument of the Avro Arrow jet located in Barry's Bay, Ontario, with an idea in mind. First, I must say I am certainly no expert in editing software, and that I approach my editing as simply as I can. While shooting this grand airplane, I felt I could try to make this look as real as possible. Using Adobe Elements software, I processed the original image in the raw program. I am sure there are more professional ways to approach this picture, such as selecting the main image and replacing the background, but I am pleased with my end result.

When I took the image my main concern was not to have any of the trees merging with the actual plane. This meant getting down low and shooting up under the wings. Then, in Elements, I processed the raw image in the usual way with a bit of contrast, reduced some highlights in the clouds, and did a bit of sharpening.




The first thing to attempt in Elements was to remove the trees. This was done fairly easily by using the clone stamp tool and carefully copying the clouds from other areas to where the trees were. The one tricky area to watch was the wing tip when removing the flags. As the wing tip is close to the flags, I had to be cautious not to copy any clouds over the end of the wing.

The trickiest part for me was to now remove the support posts at the rear of the plane. Here I used the Polygonal Lasso Tool to carefully select the exhaust area of the plane and then going to Select and clicking on Inverse. This would now allow me to clone clouds over the mounting posts without having to worry about having copied clouds merging with the planes exhaust.

After removing all of the unwanted parts of the image, all that remained was to add a little contrast and lighten some areas, and darken the area under the exhaust to create a smoke effect and then crop to a square format. This, then, left me with my final image.





The Story Behind the Photos by Dawn Macklin


For years when travelling, or just driving somewhere as a passenger, I have enjoyed taking pictures as we drove. My settings were adjusted according to the lighting, but little else, as I was trying to get images with movement or blurring. My favourite topic at the time was fall foliage and trees.

In 2016 we visited Scotland with our niece and nephew and photography was the priority for all four of us. However, when we weren't the ones driving I was constantly frustrated at missing scenery that screamed for photo attention, and quickly I decided that I had to find a way to make this trip work for me. I certainly understood that we all don't have the same photography interests and also many roads didn't offer suitable places to pull off and stop. Ultimately many of my best images were shot while driving, either through the window or with the window open if I had the chance.

In Scotland I was shooting with a Canon 7D and frequently a 70 mm – 200mm lens, which I found worked well. I used manual exposure with the following settings: shutter speed between 1/1000 and 1/2000, f – stop anywhere from f 5.6 to f 8, and ISO dependent on the light, from 100 to as high as 1600 (I wasn't happy with the results when using anything higher than 1600, especially when shooting through a window).








The Story Behind the Photos Continued

A couple of years later, while in Iceland (using a Canon 5D Mark III with lens 24mm – 105mm) I was prepared to use the same approach, but, since we were on a bus, I was faced with a new problem. With tinted windows, I was forced to consistently use a higher ISO, nothing lower than 800. For images that were still darker than they should have been I found PhotoShop solved that problem once I was home.

When photographing images at a closer range, the results are sharper if shot through the front window of the car rather than the side view. To avoid window reflections, I hold the camera as close to the window as possible. When focussing at a distance, through the car window, I find that small to tiny marks on the window itself don't tend to show up on the image.

Routinely, when I get in the car now I set my shutter speed at 1/2000 and f stop 5.6 to be prepared for any surprise photo ops.

Image Submission Guidelines by Terry Carpenter

Members can submit up to three images each for monthly theme, and six images for photographers choice, and up to three images for each outing. Please note that the Theme images should be shot within the current year of the club.

Outing images submitted must be from the current outing and from the same day as the outing. Due to risks of COVID-19, outings may be scheduled for weekdays. During the pandemic, if you are working or have other commitments for the scheduled day, you can shoot the outing images at your leisure. However, they still must be from the chosen location and shot within the week (7 days) after the original assigned outing date. If you have images from a previous outing, they can be submitted into the PC category. Images must be submitted by the <u>Tuesday Midnight</u> before the monthly meeting. Images submitted after this time may not be shown.

Before submitting your images Please title and re-size as instructed below. Images must be in JPEG. We prefer that the images be down-sized, but if there is a problem with down-sizing just send them in full size and they will be sized before going into the slide show.

Re-sizing your images:

Images must be submitted in JPEG format. It is recommended, but not mandatory, that images be re-sized according to the following standards:

If the image is landscape orientation (width greater than height), re-size the width to be 1024 px and allow the height to adjust automatically.

If the image is portrait orientation (height greater than width), re-size the height to be 768 px and allow the width to adjust automatically.

If the image is square, re-size it to 1,024 px on any side.

After re-sizing them, give each image a simple title, such as Lift locks At Sunset. **DO NOT ADD YOUR NAME**. The new system will automatically put your name onto the image for presentation.

To submit your images please go to http://www.peterboroughphotographicsociety.com/ then to Home and then to Image Submission. The first thing you will see on this page is Preparing Images for Club Slideshow. Please click on this to find out all the information for submitting images.

Image Submission Guidelines Continued

Now go back to the Image Submission page. Scrolling down the page you will see all the Categories we use. Theme, Photographers Choice, Breakfast Outing, Outing, Members Slideshows, and Miscellaneous Files. Here you will also see a brief description of each category.

You will see each category highlighted in blue. This will be the link to click on to submit your images. Click on the blue link and this will take you to a Dropbox page asking you to choose your files. Click this icon and it will open a page where you can select the images you wish to submit (you do not need a Dropbox account and do not need to Sign In to Drop-box). Please do not attempt to submit folders of images, even though Dropbox presents that as an option.

Highlight your selected images and click on "Open" at the bottom right hand corner of the pop-up. This will direct you to a page showing you which category you have selected, show you the images you have selected, and ask you for your name and e-mail. After typing this information click on Upload at the bottom of the page. And that is all there is to it. I know in print it sounds like a lot, but in reality it is very quick and smooth. Now, close the page and go to the next category and repeat the instructions.

PLACING DROPBOX ICONS ON THE DESKTOP

- 1 Go to the PPS website and go to the IMAGE SUBMISSIONS on the left hand side then go to DROPBOX LINKS FOR IMAGE SUBMISSION.
- 2 Proceed down the page to one of the blue highlighted links such as THEMES OR PHOTOGRAPHERS CHOICE etc..
- 3 Click on the blue highlighted link. This will now take you to the Dropbox website. No need to click on any of the buttons.
- 4 At the top of the page in the URL box you will see something like https://www.dropbox.com/request/bPYd3c9adqfXlofHT2

HIGHLIGHT AND COPY THE ADDRESS IN THE URL BOX.

- 5 Almost done. Now go to your desktop and RIGHT CLICK ON A BLANK AREA. In the drop-down menu GO TO NEW AND THEN TO SHORTCUT. A BOX WILL POP UP called **Type the location of the item** PASTE THE COPIED URL IN THIS BOX AND THEN HIT NEXT.
- 6 NOW IT WILL ASK YOU TO TYPE A NAME FOR THIS SHORTCUT. TYPE IN THE NAME YOU WOULD LIKE FOR THE SHORTCUT SUCH AS THEME OR PC ETC. Now click on finish.
- 7 Go to your desktop and you will now see a new icon titled THEME etc. If you click on this it will take you to the appropriate Dropbox location where you can now submit your images.
- 8 Repeat the above instructions for the rest of the PPS themes.

Please make sure the pictures you send are placed into the correct Dropbox category. Images sent in the wrong Dropbox will automatically be placed into the category to which you have sent them.
