CAPTURE THE MOMENT

This summer I was fortunate to get in a few extended getaways to Algonquin Park. My time in the park always feels like a gift to myself, especially when I'm with family or friends. Algonquin is a real gem and should be on any photographer's list of local destinations. It's only about a two-and-a-half-hour drive from Peterborough, which still qualifies as a day trip.


My favourite getaway activity there has always been, and continues to be, a canoe trip. Ideal for my best photographic efforts, right? But I've found that I don't tend to carry my standard DSLR photo gear on these trips for a few reasons:

- 1) Too heavy, too bulky, and we have plenty of other hefty stuff to get in and out of canoes to transport over long and rough portages
- 2) We're always on the go, setting up or tearing down the campsite, gathering firewood, making meals, etc., and I like to spend a lot of time on my landscape images
- I don't want to spend time away from my compatriots who don't share my love of photography.

But that doesn't mean I come away with nothing. I happen to own a smart phone and must admit I've taken more than a few shots that I've thought turned out rather well. The cameras in today's phones have come a long way, to the extent that I think of my device as a camera that also happens to let me send texts and make calls.

My cell's camera happens to support RAW and JPEG images. The RAW files use the DNG format at 12.2 MP compared to the same JPEG at 4 MP, with both images at 4032 X 3024 pixels. I've found that the quality of the raw file, or even the JPEG, allows me to still do the same kind of post-processing I apply to my DSLR RAW images.

Of course, the cell phone does exhibit serious limitations:

- 1) No inherent capability to use filters
- 2) Cannot shoot long exposures (at least not on a "reasonably priced" phone)
- 3) Limited to single lens (okay, some expensive phones now have up to three lenses)
- 4) Fixed aperture places constraints on depth of field, or achieving a bokeh effect
 - 5) Limited optical zoom (one of my main peeves).

My main concern before taking the phone shot: Is it a good composition? That question is no less important with the cell phone than it is for any type of camera I am using.

Sure, I would love to always have my DSLR, tripod, filters and lenses with me on canoe trips, but when it's not practical, I can use a phone to frame a compelling composition that I can then perhaps return to photograph later. I always experience captivating landscape scenes on my backcountry trips, but being without my preferred camera, I don't hesitate to use my phone. The main thing is to capture the moment before it is gone.

There are restaurants in Haliburton, eg., the Kosy Korner on Highland Street.


Members can meet on November 12 in the parking lot at 11:00 am (see map). It is approximately a 1.5-hour drive from Peterborough.


